Celebrating the Arts During Black History Month

Aretha Franklin (1942-2018)

Aretha Franklin was a multiple grammy winning singer known as the "Queen of Soul" for her best-selling records "Respect," "Freeway of Love" and "I Say a Little Prayer." In 1987 she became the first female artist to be inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, and in 2008 she won her 18th Grammy Award, making her one of the most honored artists in Grammy history.

"We all require and want respect, man or woman, Black or white. It's our basic human right."



James Van Der Zee (1886-1983)

James Van Der Zee was a prominent member of the Harlem Renaissance Movement. Born in 1886, Van Der Zee was best known for taking portraits and photographing social engagements of notable celebrities during that period. To this day, Van Der Zee is considered to have created one of the most comprehensive documentations of the Harlem Renaissance.

"Being an artist, I had an artist's instincts...You can see the picture before it's taken; then it's up to you to get the camera to see."



Alma Thomas (1891-1978)

Alma Thomas spent her whole life breaking new ground. When she graduated from Howard University in 1924, she became the first graduate of the school's new fine arts department. Her career bloomed, and she became known for her colorful, abstract artworks. In 1972, when she was 81 years old, she became the first African American woman to have a solo exhibition at the Whitney Museum of American Art.

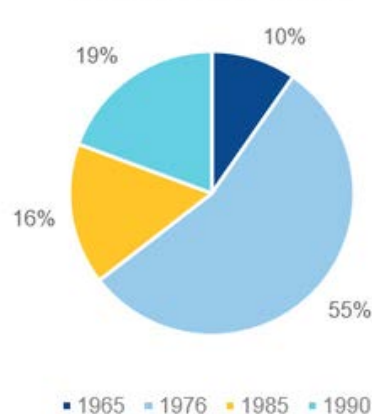
